NATIONAL POLL SHOWS ADULTS PRIMARILY BLAME INFLATION AND CRUDE OIL PRICES FOR INCREASE IN FOOD PRICES

SUMMARY

U.S. agriculture actively participates in and supports domestic and global markets. Shifts in supply and demand globally can drive substantial price changes in the U.S., even if domestic supply and demand are normal. Commodities across the board, not just agriculture, are experiencing price increases. A recent survey of consumers across the U.S. show they believe oil prices and inflation are leading to higher costs for food and fuel. **However, they don't think biofuels impact price increases for food or fuel.**



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
